"Yet not I but it's Christ in me"

Many years ago, I went through a challenging season in ministry. Resources were tight, and my academic dean informed me that the school had to eliminate the Chinese program to save money. My students pleaded with me to advocate for the Chinese ministry courses, but I had no power to change the decision. A few years later, when I stepped into the leadership role, I still found myself unable to "save the day." Another financial crisis hit. We had no money to hire full-time faculty but still had to run the same number of programs. Everyday felt like I was being asked to "make bricks without straws."

To encourage myself, I borrowed words from the story of "Ah Shun"(阿信的故事), wrote them on a card, and placed it on my desk: "Stay true to your convictions, never accept defeat"(堅守信念,永不言敗). For years, I clung to these words, pushing through adversity with sheer perseverance and determination. But over time, the weight became unbearable. In the name of endurance, I bore all the stress and burden on my own shoulders, believing that I was responsible for all of it. It was simply too much.

One day, I realized that those 8 words actually placed me in the wrong perspective when facing challenges. I flipped the card over and wrote a new phrase on the back: "Christ's power be seen through me". Instantly, I felt a sense of relief. I was reminded that God's grace is sufficient, and I found peace in surrendering the things beyond my control. I realized that my

relentless striving — trying to make things work by my own wisdom and strength — was never the way it was meant to be.

In recent years, many pastors have reported burnout, struggling with mental and emotional exhaustion. The "Savior complex" (believing the church cannot function without us) and "imposter syndrome" (feeling we are never good enough) are common struggles. As ministry leaders, we constantly navigate the expectations of others while operating in a performance-driven culture. "Striving for excellence" can subtly become an idol. Hard work is a deeply ingrained value for many of us, making it difficult to rest or care for ourselves.

Do not believe the lie that the more you do for God, the more He loves you. We know well that we are saved by grace, yet so often, we live "by works," especially in ministry. To allow Christ to live in us means letting go — of our ego, our desire for control, our achievement oriented sense of self-worth. Our identity as ministry leaders is not defined by our "success" or accomplishments. We need to admit our limitations as human beings. We are not called to and cannot carry all the burdens of the world or solve every problem.

The journey of ministry is ultimately a journey of trust — not only trusting God to help us in our work, but trusting Him to carry the burden when we cannot. When Christ truly lives in us, we will see the journey of ministry as a path of grace.

Thank the Lord for allowing me to journey through ten years together with CCST Vancouver. There's a saying: "Human affairs can have a few turnovers in ten years." I still remember when we first applied to the British Columbia (BC) provincial government for official recognition of CCST Vancouver as a higher education institution, one that could confer Master's and Doctoral degrees in theology.

A member of the government review panel asked, "There are already several theological seminaries in BC—why do we need another one?" My response was that there are many Chinese people here, and many Chinese churches, yet not a single Chinese seminary is dedicated to training future pastors to shepherd Chinese believers and provide spiritual care to the Chinese community.

Initially, the leader of the Green Party voiced opposition. But when it came to the final vote, the application was unanimously approved. Even more remarkably, within one week—before the provincial legislature adjourned—it passed all three required readings in one go. Otherwise, we would have had to wait for the next legislative session three months later, during which unforeseen changes could have occurred.

Over these past ten years, we have continuously witnessed similar miracles. Whether it was in finding a campus, finances, faculty, new board members, coworkers, or a new president—God has provided. We must also not overlook the high quality of theological students that God has brought us. Our graduates who have gone on to serve in ministry have been warmly welcomed by churches.

All the challenges and tears experienced behind the scenes were worth it, because:

"Those who sow with tears will reap with songs of joy." (Psalm 126:5)

"Not to us, Lord, not to us but to your name be the glory, because of your love and faithfulness." (Psalm 115:1)

The Graduation and Commissioning service is a simple yet solemn occasion. While graduation is certainly a day worth celebrating, it is the commissioning by God that holds even greater significance.

A pastor will typically go through three essential stages: being called, being equipped, and being sent. None of these can be skipped.

Being called means being chosen by God to be His servant—a lifelong ministry of preaching and serving Him. This becomes the focus and direction of one's life. If a person is not yet certain of God's calling, they should not step into full-time ministry.

Anyone who is clearly called must enter a seminary to be trained and equipped. For those who believe they can rely solely on self-study or the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to serve full-time, I cannot commend such an idea—and I certainly would never hire someone with that mindset as a "pastor." Without theological training, one should not take on pastoral responsibilities or shepherding roles in the church. They may serve as lay members, but nothing more. Otherwise, their so-called "full-time ministry" will not last, and the journey will be fraught with difficulties. Not only will they fail to build up the church, they may even become an obstacle to its growth.

Those who are called and trained will surely be sent by God. They will be used by Him to preach the gospel wholeheartedly, lead people to salvation, and make disciples in the church—all to expand God's kingdom.

Anyone who has been called by God, equipped, and sent must serve with a heart of humility, offering themselves to God with sincerity and devotion—fully for the Lord, not seeking personal success or empty glory (such as the praise of others). They must learn to live a life wholly devoted to glorifying God and benefiting others—a life that truly honors God.

Responding to God's Call

Dear students.

Our goal is to faithfully labor for the Lord, offering ourselves fully to be used by Him. We are to live for God, remain watchful, and live lives set apart in holiness. Dear CCST Vancouver graduates, cherish the commitment you've made before God! The path ahead will not necessarily be smooth—it may, in fact, be even more challenging than your time here at seminary. But do not lose heart. Every trial that God allows you to face is one He will equip you to overcome. Every victory will be a major step forward in your growth and ministry.

Words to the Graduates

Remember, serving Him is a lifelong commitment. Without total dedication, there is no true service. Dedication is not a one-time act—it requires continual positioning yourself in complete surrender to serve God.

A life of service needs constant renewal. Service can become a habit; without renewing your life, serving the Lord can turn into serving yourself. When life becomes dry, the greatest issue in ministry is the gradual loss of love.

Moreover, if one's inner spiritual life is not deepened during service, and ministry remains only on the surface level of activities, it is impossible to experience true inner renewal. Without drawing near to God from the heart, one will lose their first love or become lukewarm.

Do not remain in task-based ministry, simply finishing duties and considering your responsibility fulfilled. True service comes from the heart—not just completing the work but striving to do it well, always putting the interests of others first. In serving God, often ask: "Is the Lord pleased with my service? What areas of my life need to change?"

Blessings to you all as you embark on the path of serving God. Be alert at all times, so that at the end of life's journey, you may say with Paul:

"I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge, will award to me on that day—and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing." (2 Timothy 4:7–8)

Responding to the Call — All for Jesus

Every servant of God is one who has responded to His call: "Here am I, send me!" With unwavering commitment, they live wholly for Jesus, just as Brother Bian Yunbo once resolutely declared:

"It is with my own hands that I willingly lay down the pleasures of this world;

It is with my own feet that I willingly run this path of suffering!

"Choosing" this path without freedom was not out of helplessness—

On the contrary, it was the bold exercise of my own "freedom"!

Therefore,

I would rather let tears flow inward,

- 5. "When ministry is most difficult, only the call of God can sustain us." John Calvin
- 6. Write down your calling testimony. Regularly remind yourself why and for whom you serve. (Acts 26:19)
- 7. Take every opportunity to share your calling testimony—revisit your experiences to inspire yourself and others. (Hebrews 10:24)
- 8. Be faithful in serving the Lord, and you will be blessed throughout your life. (Psalm 16:2; John 12:26)
- 9. Give thanks in all things. (1 Thessalonians 5:18)
- 10. Always remember to give all glory to the One who called us. (Revelation 4:11)




Be a Witness for the Lord, and Suffer for Him. (2 Timothy 1:7–12)

Paul uses his own example to show that true faith is not merely about personal blessing, but about courageously taking up the mission. Even in the face of persecution and imprisonment, we are called to remain faithful to the very end.





"He Himself bore our sins" in His body on the tree, so that we might die to sin and live for righteousness; "by His wounds you have been healed." For "you were like sheep going astray," but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls." (1 Peter 2:24–25)

Be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, watching over them—not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not pursuing dishonest gain, but eager to serve; not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock. And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away." (1 Peter 5:2–4)

May you, dear fellow graduates, never forget the Lord's great grace—He bore our sins to redeem us, the lost sheep. Because of this, we no longer live in sin, but live for righteousness.

This great redemptive grace also brings wholeness and healing to our entire being. Let us, then, become "wounded healers," leading other lost sheep back to the Shepherd and Guardian of their souls!

A shepherd is one who tends to people as sheep—Be shepherds of God's flock that is among you, watching over them... being examples to the flock.

As pastors, we must shepherd with a willing heart, wholehearted effort, pure motives, and passionate devotion. We are to lead by example and give our all.

And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away!

But the hand of the Almighty did not let me go. At 29, I unexpectedly found myself stepping through the gates of Alliance Blble Seminary in Hong Kong. At that time, I hadn't even read through the Bible once. Yet, I felt a strong prompting from the Holy Spirit to complete reading both the Old and New Testaments before enrollment.

While taking the ferry to Cheung Chau for the entrance exam, I still had a few of the Minor Prophets left unread. So, I hurriedly skimmed through them on the ferry, and then continued reading furiously at a teahouse near the pier. At last, I managed to complete my very first full read-through of the Bible just in time. During the entrance exam, when I saw the question, *"Have you completed reading the Old and New Testaments once?"*—I checked the box without hesitation, with cold sweat on my brow and tears of gratitude in my eyes.

Four years of intensive theological training rekindled my love for learning and gave me a deep experience of God's shaping hand. Later, I completed a master's degree while working part-time. I thought that would be the end of my academic journey—but "Never say: Never." In 2022, I enrolled in the Doctor of Ministry program at CCST Vancouver. Although I didn't obtain the doctoral degree in the end, I completed all the course requirements except for the dissertation—which still feels like a closure for me.

When I first immigrated to Canada, I simply wanted to seek opportunities through work—I had no intention of returning to the classroom. But God knows my personality well: Without pressure, no motivation. He always had to push me to study. Do I do it willingly or not? It doesn't really matter. As Dr. Ying Fuk-Tsang of Alliance Blble Seminary once wisely said:

"Force yourself to be willing, be willing to be forced."

Only now do I truly understand the wisdom in those words.

Thank God for His guidance. I've finally obtained my OWP (Open Work Permit), and in 2024 I began serving in pastoral ministry at Port Moody Pacific Grace MB Church. I have received so much grace along the way. Special thanks to the seminary professors and to Brother Raymond and Sister Krista of CCST Vancouver—their care and smiles were always encouraging. I'm also deeply grateful for my fellow classmates. May we continue to support one another and grow in fellowship as we serve in Canada.



"Immerse Hybrid" breaks geographical barriers, enabling online students wherever they are to learn alongside on-campus classmates. This flexible model provides study opportunities for working professionals and those in ministry, and serves students across Canada and beyond. Students needs to complete internships locally and come to Vancouver annually for a two-week inperson retreat and intensive course to nurture community life and spiritual friendships.
